Dear members,

Hi Everyone! My name is Russ Ingram and I am your Board President. As I have thought about last year and the progress we have made, I am thankful for all those that have made the progress possible, the Board of Directors, the Administrative Staff, our CEO and COO, but most importantly the members of the organization. We were faced with having to make some complicated and hard decisions that had they not been made would have resulted in the Center not being able to operate. Because of the decisions made, although difficult, but necessary, we find ourselves in a much more secure financial position. We still have a ways to go. We have formed a new committee called Congregate Meals and Membership. We are exploring ways to provide congregate meals. The reality is however, until we have a sustainable income source, that will allow for both folks normally attending, as well as transportation and support for those unable to drive themselves to the center, we cannot commit to bringing congregate meals back. The worst thing we could do would be to bring meals back prematurely and have to cancel them in 2-3 months. The Center would not survive if we did that. We are working diligently to identify that sustainable income source. The committee is also looking at alternate plans for meals and also ways to increase and revitalize our membership. We have met hard challenges and overcome them and have survived the storm. We will persevere.

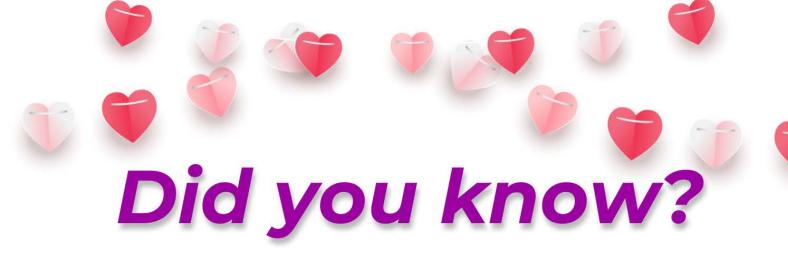

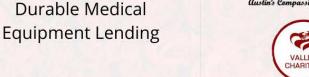

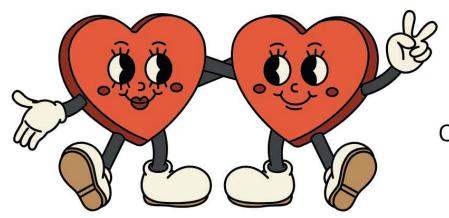
