Part 2 Tent City

On May 23, 1935 the preliminary drawing for the order the men would line up for the land drawing. A single cardboard box was brought out with small bits of paper, detailing a tract of land and the tracts number. The first tract of land was drawn by Arthur Hack of Minnesota. If unhappy with their tract drawing or who would like to remain closer to family or friends colonists were permitted to swap tracts.

Once the drawing was concluded construction on the colony could officially start. Ten tent camps throughout the valley. The transient housing was named Camp Perkins. The largest of the tent camps was named Palmer. The remaining

camps where located around large clusters of land tracts.

Due to the high amount of timber in the area the original plan for the colonist homes to be made of logs, however due to the size of the logs it was determined that frame buildings. Originally the transients were going to build all the homes



but when project due dates lapsed and winter was coming, so colonist were able to begin building their own homes.

As the homes began to emerge work also began on the community centers such as the trading posts, warehouse, powerhouse, and garage were some of the first to be constructed.
